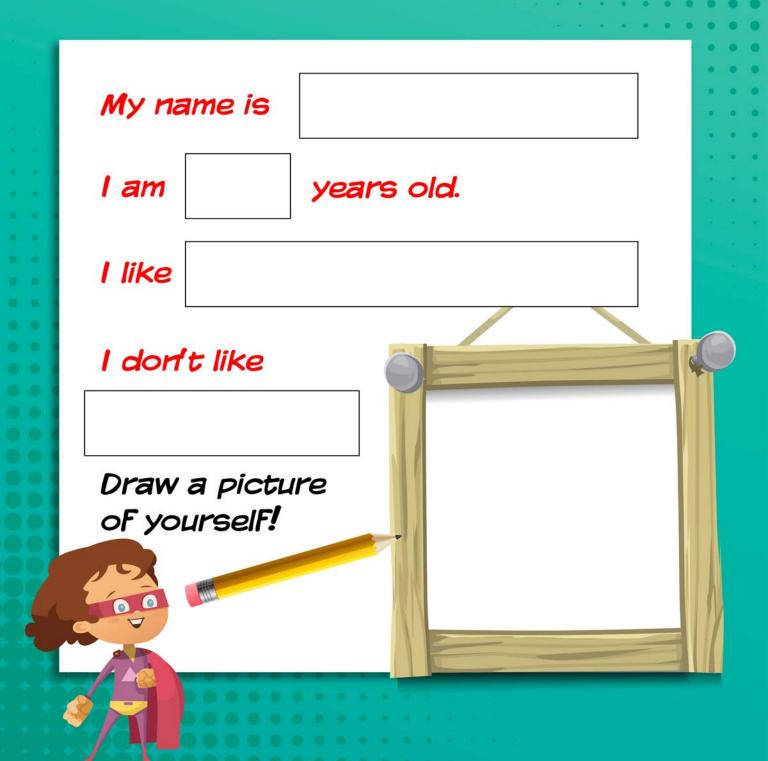

Why do I need to be Fostered or 'Looked aFter'?





Sometimes a child's Family cannot look after them and keep them safe. This can be for lots of different reasons. Other grown-ups can help look after children to make sure that they are safe, happy and healthy.

What is Fostering?

You might need to go to live somewhere else. When a child has to live away From their Family, they usually go to stay with a Foster Family. Your Foster Family will look after you and take good care of you. You are not alone. At any one time there are about 50,000 children and young people living in Foster care in this country.

Who are Foster carers?

Foster carers are special adults who have been chosen by Channels and Choices to look after children who can't live at home with their Family. All Foster Families are different, but their job is all the same; all Foster Families are there to look after you and make you Feel safe.



Who will I live with and what will they be like?

When a Foster carer is being chosen, we always make sure that we try to match your ethnicity, culture and religious needs (iF you have any). We also try to make sure that they live near to your school, college and Friends.

Most importantly the Foster carer will need to understand you. A lot of work is done to find a suitable family.



Your Foster Family may eat the same kind of Food as you and celebrate the same special days like Christmas, Eid-Al-Addha or Passover. Even if your carers do not share the same tastes, or perhaps the same religion, it is important you know they will do all they can to meet your needs, beliefs and wishes.

"My Foster carers understand me and have never been annoyed with me." "My Foster carers are the best I could I ever have"

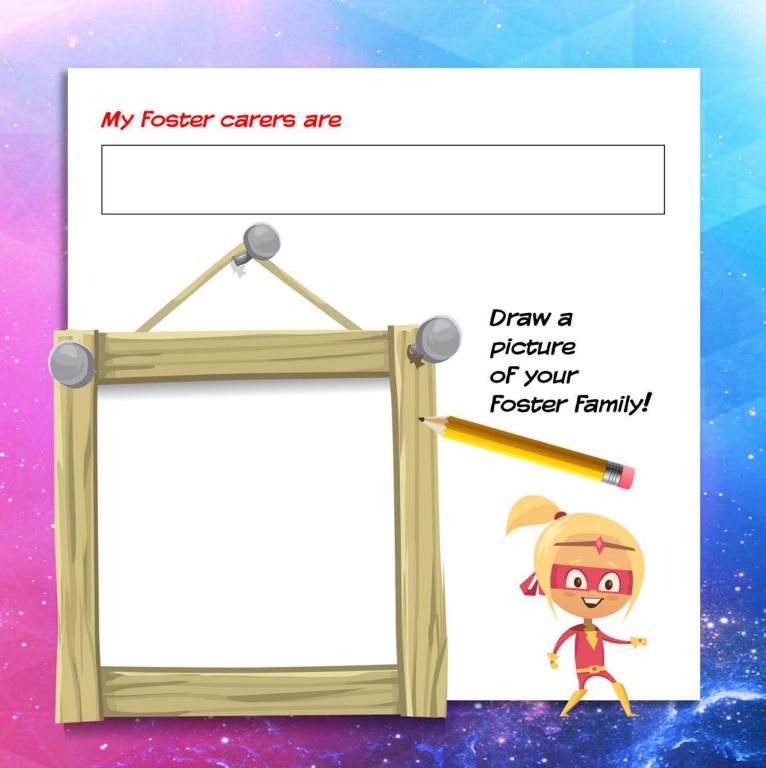
"IF I could go back and change anything, I wouldn't or I wouldn't be where I am now (with my carers)."

Your Foster carer will also do lots of the things that most parents do like taking you to school if you can't go by yourself and helping you with your homework, but most importantly they will make sure you are kept healthy and happy, take you on outings and give you support with any hobbies or interests you might have.

If there is enough time we will always do our best to let you meet your Foster Family before you move in. If you have not met them already, then we will always try to make sure that you are given some information about them as soon as possible. All our Foster carers have a booklet called 'All About Us' which includes photos and tells you who is in the Family, where they live and things they like to do.



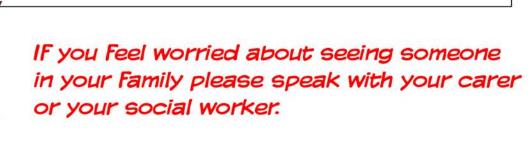
We have asked what some of our Foster carers would like you to know about being Fostered...

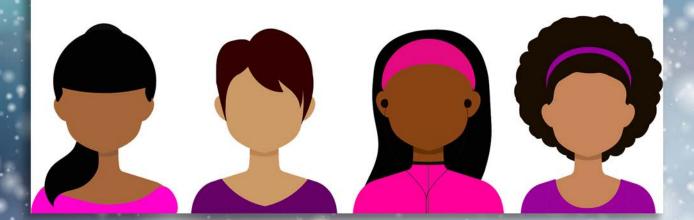
What does the Channels and Choices supervising social worker do?

Your Foster carers have their own Supervising Social Worker. Their job is to make sure your carers are looking after you properly and have all the help and support they need. Their job is also to make sure you are happy and well cared for.

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is a Supervising Social Worker and it's their job to visit your Foster Family in the same way that your social worker comes to meet with you.

When you meet with they will always be pleased to hear how you are and to see what you are doing at school, or at your Foster home.

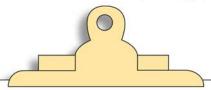


Before they find you a family, your social worker will tell Channels and Choices everything they need to know about you so we can find the right Foster Family For you.

When you first go to live with your Foster carer they will show you around your new home. They will show you where you will sleep, where you can play and where you will eat your meals. You will also meet the other grown-ups, children and pets who might also live in the house with you. You will have your own bedroom.



Once you have moved into your Foster Family's home, there will be a meeting which is a chance For you to talk about the day-to-day arrangements of what it will be like For you living in your Foster home. This includes keeping to a routine, going to school and Following the Family rules, or a chance to ask any other questions if there's anything you'd like to know about living with your new Foster Family. You can tell them about your Favourite things to do, what meals you like to eat and anything that you don't like.



Every family has rules. These are about how to treat each other, about listening to each other and about keeping safe. What are your foster carers' rules?

You could write them down to help you remember.
